Canadian Centre of Excellence in Oncology Advanced Practice Nursing (OAPN) ... Upcoming Consensus Workshop

In the Spring of 2010, OAPN will be hosting a Consensus Workshop to establish national priorities for promoting the development and integration of APN roles within the Canadian cancer control system.

OAPN has received three years of infrastructure funding from Amgen Canada to develop and establish three parallel but integrated clinical and health services research programs related to:

- 1. Developing and evaluating new advanced clinical nursing therapies for specific cancer populations and disease or treatment related symptoms
- 2. New models of APN care and cancer control to address unmet patient health needs and gaps in care delivery
- 3. Interventions to improve our understanding, development, recruitment, retention and use of APN roles in cancer control

Ruth Martin-Misener, affiliate faculty of the APN Chair program discussed employment patterns and practice activities of primary health care NPs in Nova Scotia. Results of the study indicate that NPs in Nova Scotia are working to their scope of practice.

Continuing Education for Primary Health Care Nurse Practitioners in Ontario: Survey Results Faith Donald, affiliate faculty of the APN Chair program discussed continuing education (CE) learning needs of practicing primary health care nurse practitioners (PHCNPs) in Ontario, CE barriers and facilitators, and CE delivery preferences. Overall, CE is an important issue for PHCNPs. Strategies to overcome barriers and support learning needs are multifactorial, requiring systematic planning and evaluation.

Spotlight on Research

Faith Donald and Alba DiCenso, affiliate faculty and APN Chair and their research team received funding from the Ministry of Health and Long Term Care (MOHLTC), Nursing Secretariat for a systematic review of the scientific literature to determine the economic impact of advanced practice nurses (APNs):
